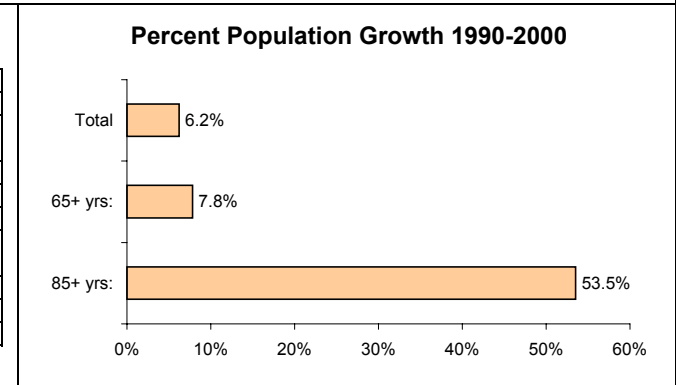

Humboldt is the largest and most populous of the north coast counties, a land of forests along the Pacific Ocean. In 2000, the median age was 3 years older than that of the state of California. More than one of every 8 people was over 65 years of age and one in 59 was over 85. One in 4 adults was 65+ or disabled.	The unemployment rate was 6.1% (2001). There were projected to be 149 job openings for RNs in the region and an estimated 240 direct care nursing staff were needed in facilities (2000). Average hourly wages (2001):

In Humboldt County, one in every 6 people was eligible for Medi-Cal (2000).	The median home price was not available (2001). Housing vacancy rates in 2000 were higher than the state's average: homeowners at 1.7%; rentals at 4.7%. Humboldt had more households with individuals 65+ (20.3%) and 65+ living alone (9.2%) than California on average. Of those 65 and older, one in 2.4 were living alone (41.4%).

Demographic Trends

Humboldt County's population has grown at half the pace of California in the last decade. The was also slower growth in those 65 and older, but there was a faster pace of growth for those 85 and older.

In 2000, Humboldt had 18% non-Whites and the state had 53% non-Whites. One of every 15 persons was Hispanic/Latino; one in 19 was American Indian/Alaska Native; one in every 27 persons was multi-racial; and one in 63 was Asian. Looking at age and ethnicity: one in 8 was 65+/White and one in 263 was American Indian/Alaska Native.

The median household income was nearly \$16,300 less than California's, with a more people living below the poverty level—one in 5.
