

## All Roads Lead to Quality and Equity

An extensive body of research shows that programs with the most positive impact on child development, school readiness, and success in life have these common ingredients:

- Early learning and development program standards and aligned curriculum
- Well-prepared and well-compensated workforce
- Ongoing professional development
- Sufficient learning time for children
- Small class sizes and favorable adultto-child ratios to best support responsive instruction
- Screening and referral
- Meaningful family engagement



# By 2030

California's early childhood system delivers on the promise of a *California for All Kids* by improving life outcomes for young children by

- providing comprehensive early learning and care for infants and toddlers;
- ensuring that all families can easily identify, access, and choose care that meets their needs;
- promoting school readiness through universal preschool; and
- growing the quality, size, and stability of the early care and learning workforce.





## Federal Stimulus Proposals

## **Senate**

Proposes \$15 billion in child care relief

**JULY 2020** 

\$10 billion Child Care Stabilization Fund

\$5 billion through the CCDBG

For fixed costs, increased operating expenses due to COVID-19, safely reenrolling children

## House

Passes \$57 billion in relief for child care sector

**OCTOBER 2020** 

\$50 billion child care stabilization grants for personnel, sanitation, training and other costs related to reopening and operations

\$7 billion emergency funding for CCDBG program


\$1.7 billion Head Start and Early Head Start

## White House

Proposes \$25 billion in child care relief

**SEPTEMBER 2020**

# Accelerating Change Through Federal Partnership President-Elect Biden's Proposals


## Stabilize access to care and learning for children and families:


